Iris Robinson

Iris Robinson Creer, 98, died in Provo, Utah, September 15, 2007 of congestive heart failure. She was born 9 October 1908 in Springville, Utah, the third of four children of Walter and Nellie Ross Robinson.

Iris received all her education in Provo schools. She attended Maester Elementary, Central Middle, Provo High and graduated from Brigham Young University in 1931 with a major in art and a minor in physical education. While at BYU she was president of Nautilus Social Unit, sang with the Ladies' Glee Club and participated in dance. She also joined the women's track team, competing in the high jump and hurdles in which she took second place in the state. Iris taught art and history at Forrer Junior High School the first year the school was opened.

As a young girl she particularly enjoyed hiking, swimming, dancing, reading, art and doing needlework. She hiked to the top of Mt. Timpanogos nine times.

Iris was married to Norman Banks Creer on 27 May 1932 in the Salt Lake Temple. During their marriage they resided in Arizona, Palo Alto, CA, Salt Lake City, Concord, CA, and Provo. Norman died 19 March 1973.

An active member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, Iris held many teaching and leadership positions in the Relief Society and Primary organizations. From 1962 to 1970 she served on the General Board of the YWMA.

Iris spent a great deal of her life in community service, serving in PTA, Cub Scouts, as a Republican Precinct Chairman in California and as Provo City Heart Fund Chairman. She always belonged to a literary group, sometimes several at the same time. In Provo she was a member of the Reader's Guild. She participated in A.A.U.W. for many years, serving in leadership positions on the local and state levels in California. Her artistic talents were always in demand for decorations and flower arranging. While in California, her home was decorated annually for the Concord Christmas Decorations home tour.

She once said she was a collector of memories, evidenced by her compilation of 13 personal and family history books, including genealogies, histories, photos and documents. She also compiled many photo albums. Her memory will live on with these books and her paintings, quilts, and needlework.

Iris was preceded in death by her parents, husband and siblings, including her brother, Rondo Robinson, and sisters Florence Beck and Phyllis Long. She is survived by her children, Kay (Rex) Gardner, Provo; Gordon (Janice), Ireland Dublin Mission; and David (Ann), American Fork; 13 grandchildren and 31 great-grandchildren.
